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Summer Food Service Program Site at KRBC

We are praising the Lord for the opportunity to make our church facilities available for the Ohio Department of Education Summer Food Service Program. As one of twenty-five churches under the umbrella of Grace Apostolic Church, we will welcome children from our neighborhood to enjoy a free prepackaged boxed lunch on Mondays - Fridays starting June 14 through August 22. Children already receiving a free lunch during the school year will now have lunch provided for them throughout the summer. It may be their only meal for the day. Nearly 500 children in our attendance zone are eligible due to family income and circumstances. These children may be home alone through the summer or their family may not have money to provide these nutritious meals.

The Lord has truly provided this opportunity to serve through many unexpected ways. We know it has been made possible through His plan and He will use our service for His glory. This is a tangible way for our church family to give support to our community and neighborhood. The churches who have participated in the program in the past years have seen a significant increase in Sunday attendance and also weekday programs by those receiving this valuable help. We will begin to develop relationships with families in our community. We will provide a special activity each week to tell children in grades K-12 the Good News about the Lord Jesus.



Your help is needed for ten weeks to serve the prepackaged meals and supervise the children while they eat. We are hoping for enough volunteers to have two people distribute the boxed lunches and two people supervise the children while they eat. There is no food prep or clean-up involved as the boxed lunches will be delivered to us already prepared. You may be able to volunteer one day each week or one week of the summer. Any time you can give will help make the program possible. Several people have already come forward to offer their help. Our plan is to provide an extended time each Wednesday to include special activities such as game days, crafts, computer time, and entertainment.

One exciting aspect of the program is that we will now be able to offer free breakfast and lunch to all our Jesse Coles Day Camp participants! Not all of you may be able to be involved in this hands-on manner, yet everyone can pray for this opportunity to touch the hearts and lives of children and families. Please begin to pray now for those who can help, for safety of the children and staff, and for the Lord to guide and bless our efforts to serve Him this summer.

Campus Crusade for Christ Update

Campus Crusade for Christ is committed to "building *spiritual movements everywhere, so that everyone knows someone who truly follows Jesus.*" Our desire is that the presence of Jesus through His people, will so fully saturate any population that His life would be inescapable—that every corner someone will find himself engaging with Jesus. To that end, we "win" people to Christ, "build" them in their faith, and "send" them out into their spheres of influence a living, breathing, speaking witnesses to Jesus and His transformation. These are not mere slogans for any of the ministries of Campus Crusade. We take them seriously at The Ohio State University campus where we work. We are committed to making Jesus known and developing others who will faithfully do the same. It's not particularly flashy or showy. We just talk about Jesus and talk about Jesus some more and keep talking about Jesus.

Daily, my wife Jenny and I work face-to-face with college students — those we're discipling and training as spiritual leaders who are multiplying their faith and those who are not yet followers of Jesus. The movement at OSU includes over 600 students in small group Bible studies and those attending our weekly meeting in the largest available lecture room on campus. Ultimately, attracting students to a meeting is nothing to boast about. But their life-change and influence on campus and round the world are the works of God's Spirit and are

praiseworthy. God has caused the growth. Presently, our student movement at OSU supplies laborers for two international partnership locations - Valencia, Venezuela and Ljubljana, Slovenia - where we will continue to send students and staff until a local, indigenous, self-sustaining student movement is raised up.

We're grateful for KRBC's partnership with us in the proclamation of the gospel. The church, and many individuals within the church, have been financial supporters and prayer partners since 1997, when as a college student myself, I traveled to Baku, Azerbaijan (north of Iran) on a summer trip with Campus Crusade, which was a significant step in my own process of becoming a missionary.

In addition to expressing our own thanks to you, we want to share with you several things for which Jenny and I give thanks to God - *laborers sent into the harvest*:

- From the beginning of our ministry, 2 couples have been sent to the mission field where they remain (one in Turkey with their denomination; one in East Asia with Campus Crusade); 6 men have been sent to seminary to study toward the pastorate, counseling, and/or professorship; 2 others spent over 5 years traveling with the Jesus Film project single-handedly at work on audio translation projects for millions

of future viewers; and 4 invested a year or more following graduation as interns with Campus Crusade for Christ here at OSU. In all, 14 men and women have been sent into vocational ministry in some capacity.

- Even now, 3 of our students are preparing to go to Slovenia for the next year.
- Among all the students previously mentioned, 3 first trusted Jesus as their Savior during college.
- In my last ten years on staff, we have had the privilege of leading or helping to lead 7 international trips to Azerbaijan and France, taking over 100 students to participate in movement-building around the world, for the glory of God. We hope to make our first trip to Slovenia next summer.
- These facts are attributable just to our personal ministry. The collective fruit (beyond Jenny and me) from the OSU ministry as a whole is even more inspiring. We are indebted to you. Together we have advanced God's kingdom in real and profound ways. Your investment has brought a significant yield not only in heaven but very tangibly here and now. Just look at what you have to show for it - men and women in the harvest! Praise be to God. Thank you so much for your love, care, and commitment to the cause of the gospel.
