

Samaritan's Purse

Imagine being in a third-world country on Christmas morning. Perhaps there is no Christmas dinner. Your home may have a dirt floor, or you may live on the streets searching for warmth and something to eat. That will be Christmas for millions of children around the world this year. But there is something that each of us can do.



It is as simple as packing one or more shoeboxes with small toys (such as a car, ball, doll, stuffed animal, kazoo, harmonica, yo-yo, jump rope, and Slinky), hard candy, school supplies, socks, underwear, hygiene projects (Ivory bar soap in a plastic bag, toothbrush, toothpaste, comb, etc.). **Do not** include used items, war-related items such as toy guns, knives or military figures, chocolate or perishable food, liquids, lotions, vitamins, aerosol cans or glass items. Samaritan's Purse will pack a booklet that tells the story of Jesus birth, death on the cross for our sins, and resurrection. As we join with thousands of Christians across America and in many other countries, through our gifts and the story of salvation, this can be the best Christmas in the lives of children around the world.

How can you be part of this exciting ministry? Just stop by the Operation Shoe Box table in the church lobby and pick up a brochure, an envelope for your suggested \$7 donation to help with shipping and a label to designate your gift for a boy or girl and the child's age category: 2-4, 5-9 or 10-14. Wrap a shoebox with Christmas paper and fill it with the goodies. If you are not good at wrapping shoeboxes, we will provide a wrapped box for your use. Bring the filled boxes back to church by Sunday, November 14 when all of the boxes will be dedicated before sending them on their way to the children. Last year Karl Road Baptist provided 114 boxes to Samaritan's Purse.

One of the lesser known ministries of our church is to provide a post-funeral meal (usually a lunch) for a family when their loved one has died. Providing food after a funeral service is a traditional and considerate gesture, especially when people have come from out of town or the service concludes near mealtime. Eating together also provides a time of closure and fellowship. Family and friends gather to share a meal, comfort and support one another, and recall stories of their loved one.

The practice of feasting after a funeral dates back to funerals themselves. The two practices have been tied to one another since ancient Egyptian and Roman times, and likely go back even further in history than that. In West African villages, cattle and poultry are slaughtered and feasted on to commemorate the dead after they have been buried. The Jewish custom of Seudat Havra'ah is probably the most straightforward about the true intent of a post-funeral meal. Translated, it means "meal of consolation," a meal which is prepared for the mourners by their community.

When a family desires a post-funeral meal, someone apart from the immediate family must quickly take charge of planning and soliciting food. Our bereavement meal coordinators here at Karl Road Baptist are Dave and Dolores Suckow. They work with the family and pastors to plan a buffet meal that is served in the Fellowship Hall. If the deceased was a member of a Sunday school class or small group, often that group will prepare much of the food and help at church on the day of the meal.

Once a menu is decided, telephone calls are made to provide food and enlist serving/kitchen help. It take 4-5 people to facilitate such a meal including set-up, serving, and clean-up. Since most funerals are scheduled on a weekday, many working folk are not available to help with the physical part of the meal. Yet they can minister by providing food and delivering it to the church. It is a cook's highest honor to provide a comforting dish or favorite dessert for such a meal.

This important ministry is open to both men and women. As our church family grows and ages, we need to expand our list of interested volunteers. If you are willing to be called upon to provide a food item or if you can physically help on the day of a meal, please contact the Suckows at (614)888-3310.
