

Fred Stith leads a life filled with purpose as he has strived for the past 38 years to make a difference in his community. Dedicated to his volunteer work, he believes that a busy schedule and a 60-minute morning walk with his Brittany spaniel will keep him young and healthy.

It started with a flyer to a few local churches, seeking volunteers to help with serving continental breakfast at Oakleaf Village. Over three years ago, Fred and his wife Kathleen read the request for volunteers in the Karl Road Baptist Church bulletin and were the only ones to respond. They started volunteering five days a week for two hours and sought other volunteers.

Oakleaf Village's volunteer base grew and the residents made new friends. Fred knows many of the residents' breakfast food preferences. In addition to serving the residents, he takes time to know each one.

In January 2013, Fred suffered a serious health issue. His recruits continued to volunteer as he focused on his health. He was welcomed back to Oakleaf in April 2013.

A winter person, Fred faithfully removed snow for two neighbors this past winter. He and Kathleen are also first grade reading tutors at Binns Elementary School.

Fred is hearing impaired. From 2008 to 2013, he shared his deficiency in studies with the audiology students at the Ohio State University Speech-Language-Hearing Clinic.

The Grace Brethern Church of Columbus was his employer from 1993 to 2007. He often spent weekends with the Bill Glass Ministries, sharing the Gospel message with inmates over a nine state area. For 20 years, he made monthly visits to the Marion Correctional Institute.

In 2003 Fred received the Exemplary Community Service Award from the Rotary Club of Columbus. Rotary reported that he never said "No" to Rotary, was a four-year reading tutor at Kent Elementary School, a Colerain School Christmas party volunteer and a committee chairman.

Fred was president of the local chapter of the National Association of Christian

Business Administrators during 1997. NACBA is a volunteer organization that assists church administrators.

While he was on staff at LeVeque Enterprises, Katherine LeVeque encouraged him to join the Junior Achievement of Central Ohio Board of Directors. He went from the boardroom to the classroom teaching the JA "Project Business" and the "Secret of Staying in School" classes in Columbus high schools and middle schools.

In 1990 he received the National Junior Achievement Bronze Award for his innovative design of a staying in school program at Franklin Alternative Middle School. Now, he wonders if students took the advice of his business panel and stayed in school.

Fred suggests that an inner city ministry may include heartaches. The tears flow when the sibling of a student is killed in a drive-by shooting or a former student is sent to prison.

Fred was born and raised in Sunbury, Ohio. During the "Cold War," he served 16 months in Germany with the 4th Armored Division of the U.S. Army.

Fred hopes his legacy of service will continue with his two sons, daughter, and four grandchildren.





Obregons Induction Into University of Toledo's Medical Mission Hall of Fame



Dr. Pedro "Pete" and Judith Obregon were members of the 12th class that were inducted into The University of Toledo's College of Medicine and Life Sciences Medical Mission Hall of Fame Saturday, March 22.

Pete & Judy Obregon

"Dr. Pete Obregon is the product of an American medical mission in the Philippines. His parents were the first converts to the Christian faith in Hollo in the early 1900s.

After graduating from a Baptist university in the Philippines, he had a private practice in Point Pleasant, WV, and later in Columbus, OH. While Pete and Judith started two homeless clinics in Columbus, they were dedicated to care for the underserved medical and surgical needs of the poor in the third world. Their medical mission work included the Philippines, El Salvador, Africa, the Dominican Republic and Mexico.

In 1993, Pete was appointed medical director for the Medical Ministry International for Africa, Asia and Eastern Europe. He left private practice to work full time for the organization. Since making that life-transforming decision, Pete and Judith have taken 134 medical and surgical teams to 39 countries. Judith has served as project director for many of the missions and she has taught respiratory therapy techniques to nurses."

Revelation 7:9 is about the end of time, when all believers gather around the throne of God *"there before me was a great multitude that no one could count, from every nation, tribe, people and language, standing before the throne and before the Lamb."* We know the end of the story, but we don't have to simply wait for it to happen, we get to be a part of God's work of bringing some from every different people group into his family of believers.

As a church, we are partnered with several organizations and missionaries who work to bring the gospel to many nations. One of those organizations is International Friendships (IFI). What is great about our partnership with IFI, is that we not only contribute finances to get the work done, but we also have opportunities to invest with our time and energy. We are building a team of people who will commit to serving the newly arriving international students by picking them up at the airport, hosting them in our homes for a couple of days, helping them get items they need to set-up their housing on campus, and building friendship with them. This team will work together to meet the needs of the students we host.

There are many good reasons to participate on this KRBC/IFI Mission team, here are just 10: You can...

- ✦ learn a word or two of Chinese
- ✦ help a home-sick student feel at home
- ✦ get to know fellow KRBC folks who serve with you
- ✦ be a part of what God is doing among people of all nations
- ✦ get to experience Christ's joy as you obey God by serving the students
- ✦ do a mission together as a family (young children are great for this project)
- ✦ learn about another culture without the travel
- ✦ make a new friend
- ✦ do something interesting and out of the ordinary for a week this August
- ✦ use how God has blessed you (with spiritual gifts, a home, a car, and other stuff) to be a blessing to a student
